She is originally from Detroit Michigan; however, she is no stranger to the East Coast having graduated from Boston University this past May where she majored in Biology and Sociology. So far, Taylor has fallen easily into place here and truly feels lucky to be able to call Caroline House a home. She wears many hats, from singing *Old McDonald* with the preschoolers, to coordinating student volunteers, to translating for students and staff.

After Caroline House, Janis is continuing to work with the low income population at Breaking Ground in New York City.

When she was almost 11, her mother told her to marry a man. She loved her mother, did what she was told; she became a wife at age 11. The reason behind her mother's advice, I cannot say. Perhaps the mother wanted a better life for her daughter. Perhaps it was a step up. Maybe, but I don't know. The 11-year-old girl became a woman and had five children along the way, one of whom she's sent to Heaven.

Today, she is a grandmother of ten and one of my favorite students. She tries so hard. We start with the ABCs. "This is 'I' not 'E,'" I say. "This is 'H.' Say 'errrr' like you're very angry." "Errrr," she says 15 minutes later. "You did it. Great! Now say these words: girl, pearl, very, early, worried, married, buried." She does. She writes the words. She never gives up.

This beautiful woman is learning how to read and write in English. Progress is slow; classes are repeated. It's tedious work...for her; for me. But she reads and writes a little more and incorporates new words into her vocabulary each and every day. And when she gets her Certificate of Completion, the first diploma-type document she has ever received, she holds back her prideful smile. Then she looks up at me; and well, I'm not as strong as she... I'm dropping tears.

Q & A with a Caroline House Student

Claudia grew up in Mexico. She left school after sixth grade and began working to help her mother provide for their family. Claudia worked several jobs as a young girl and throughout her teens. She married and then moved to the U.S. with her husband seven years ago. She is currently enrolled in our Level 2 ESL class. Her daughter Lupe is three years old and attends our preschool program.

How did you first hear about Caroline House? My mother-in-law learned English here in 2009 and 2010. She told me, "Caroline House is a very good place. Everybody is very friendly."

Why did you decide to enroll in our classes? I want to learn English, because I need to understand and speak English if I go to the store or the hospital or especially when my daughter starts school. I used to cry sometimes because everybody seemed to know English and I didn't.

What has been the most challenging part of your experience so far?

English is a hard language to learn! I am still learning to say things like, "The sun is not shining." instead of "The sun is not shine." We are learning about contractions; I still get confused when I hear someone say "isn't" or "aren't" instead of "is not" or "are not."

What do you like best about Caroline House?

The teachers. They have helped me since I first came here and didn't understand any English. When I come to Caroline House I feel good. because everyone says, "hello," and "good morning,"... it's comfortable. My teachers help me so much. I like to come here.

Have your classes helped you outside the classroom?

I am much more comfortable speaking English with other people. When people say, "Good morning," "How are you?" or "What time is it?" I understand! And I can answer in English. When I go to the clinic, I can read the signs and speak with the doctor in English. I also read stories to my I really dream that my daughter in English and watch the news on TV. My husband encourages me to watch movies with him in English.

How is your daughter Lupe doing in the preschool program?

When I brought Lupe here last year, she didn't speak any English. Now she speaks English. At home, Lupe and her dad always speak to each other in English. At first Lupe was scared coming to the preschool. Now she is very social. She is more outgoing, even outside of Caroline House. She helps me more at home; she taught me "The Clean-up Song" that she learned in her class! Her writing and coloring have improved, too.

What are your hopes and dreams for the future?

I hope that my daughter will be doing well in school and that my husband will still be working. I would also like to have a job working with children or as a

hair stylist or makeup artist.

My husband, daughter and I share a 2-bedroom apartment with my husband's parents and my brother- and sister-in-law. husband and I will own our own house one day.


Financial Summary 2015-2016

Celebrating Foundation Day

On October 24th we gathered to celebrate Foundation Day, honoring the 183rd anniversary of the date when Caroline Gerhardinger - who later became Mother Theresa Gerhardinger, SSND - began a community of religious women in Bavaria. Sister Eileen Denny said that Mother Theresa was the foundress of the School Sisters of Notre Dame. Mother Theresa believed that the education of women would transform families.

After asking students, "Why are we called Caroline House?" Sister Eileen shared the story of the life of Sister Caroline. She was born in France, moved to Germany as a young girl, and was later received into the congregation by Mother Theresa. Sister Caroline was a resourceful, strong, and hard-working young woman who volunteered to come to the U.S. as a missionary when she was 22 years old. She became Mother Caroline, and she expanded the SSND's educational ministry serving youth, women and the poor throughout North America. Sister Eileen remarked, "We are proud to have Caroline House named after this great woman."
